### **Adriaan Eeckels**

JRC SciArt Project Leader



Adriaan Eeckels is a historian, humanist and semiotician. Since his university years, he has been testing boundaries, also between art and science. As a thesis proposal, he investigated the epistemological properties of the narrative in historical research, by applying semiotics in historical research with a focus on the history of mentalities in Quattrocento Florence. He describes himself as an intellectual vagabond looking for the pattern that connects, and as pontifex minimus traveling along borders and interstices of various disciplines, with a great interest in knowledge acquisition and the history of sciences. Most of his career has taken place in the European Institutions: from the Schengen Secretariat, through the European Court of Justice to the European Commission, in Luxembourg, Brussels and Ispra, Italy. He has carried out important projects in Document and Quality Management. Since 2016 he is leading the SciArt project of the Joint Research Center (JRC) of the European Commission.

This led him in 2001 to his current field of work – 'Future, Human &Technology.' Alexander Mankowsky is focused on human centered innovation utilizing futuristic technological concepts.

Anab is a designer, futurist, filmmaker and educator. As Co-founder and Director of Superflux, she catalyzes our Studio's vision to imagine and generate plural visions of precarious flourishing in challenging times. In 2009, Anab, with Jon Ardern, co-founded Superflux, to foreground the practices of speculative design, critical foresight, design fiction and experiential futures as an integral strategy for businesses, governments, foundations and NFP organisations wishing to navigate deep uncertain.

#### **Dirk Snauwaert**

Dirk Snauwaert has been involved with WIELS Contemporary Art centre since July 2004; he was appointed Artistic Director in January 2005. Before joining WIELS, Dirk Snauwaert was Co-Director of the Institut d'Art Contemporain Villeurbanne/Rhône-Alps, in France, where he was in charge of the exhibition programme and of the development of the FRAC Rhône-Alpes collection. He was Director of the Munich Kunstverein from 1996 to 2001, and, from 1989 to 1995, he was in charge of the contemporary art programme of the Société des Expositions of the Centre for Fine Arts, Brussels. He has organised and coordinated numerous exhibitions, both monographic and thematic, and he lectures and publishes regularly on art and visual culture. He has been a member of several boards, including the Flemish Community's Visual Arts Advisory Board, and he was also in charge of the acquisitions for Belgium's Flemish Community from 2003 till 2006.

### Eduardo Santana Castellón

Director of the Museo de Ciencias Ambientales in Guadalajara



Eduardo Santana is Director of the Museo de Ciencias Ambientales at the Centro Cultural Universitario de la Universidad de Guadalajara (UdeG). Of Cuban origin, Santana grew up in Puerto Rico and studied at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Since 1985, he has been a professor of wildlife and natural resource management, and urban sustainability at UdeG. He created various programs such as undergraduate & graduate degrees, research institutes, civil associations, natural protected areas and novel local environmental governance mechanisms. With collaborators he created the José Emilio Pacheco City-Nature Literature Prize, the Socio-Environmental Film Exhibition and the International Colloquium on Biodiversity, Natural Resources and Society. He has actively worked with Nahua and Wixárika indigenous communities in the defense of their resources in western Mexico, and he designed Cuba's conservation program for the World Wildlife Fund (WWF). He has been part of the governance boards of the Society for Conservation Biology, the Association for Tropical Biology and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, as well as jury member in various film, journalism and ornithology awards. Individually and collectively he has received more than 40 national and international awards

Eva Franch i Gilabert is an architect, curator, critic, and educator based in Barcelona, Prague, and New York. Franch has served as the director of the Architectural Association in London and Storefront for Art and Architecture in New York. Fernando Cucchietti leads the Data Visualization and Analytics Group at the Barcelona Supercomputing Center (BSC). Formerly she has been leading big European Research and Innovation projects related to digital sovereignty, digital democracy and crypto platforms. Francesca is Commander of the Order of Merit of the Italian Republic. Forbes Magazine included her in the Top 50 Women in Tech in 2018.

#### **Future Farmers**

Artist



Amy Franceschini is an artist and designer whose work facilitates encounter, exchange and tactile forms of inquiry by calling into question the "certainties" of a given time or place where a work is situated. An overarching theme in her work is a perceived conflict between "humans" and "nature". Her projects reveal the history and currents of contradictions related to this divide by challenging systems of exchange and the tools we use to "hunt" and "gather". Using this as a starting point, she creates relational objects that invoke action and inquiry; not only to imagine, but also to participate in and initiate change in the places we live. In 1995, Amy founded Futurefarmers as a collaborative platform to consider the social, political and environmental organization of space. Futurefarmers use various media to deconstruct systems to visualize and understand their intrinsic logics; food systems, public transportation, education. They have created temporary schools, books, bus tours, and large-scale exhibitions.

### Gaia Danese

European External Action Service



Gaia Danese is an Italian diplomat and a PhD holder in International Relations from the Institut d'Études Politiques of Paris (Sciences Po). Currently she serves as International Cultural Relations and Public Diplomacy Coordinator at European External Action Service (EEAS). Her diplomatic roles include assignments at Italian Embassies in Lisbon, Montevideo, and Madrid and as Consul General in Barcelona. In recognition of her innovative approach to public administration, Danese received the "Innovation Protagonists" award from the Italian Public Administration Forum in 2009. In 2017 the ITmakES project for cultural cooperation between Italy and Spain, coordinated by Danese, has been awarded the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs Prize for best practices in the promotion of Italy abroad. Stocker is a consultant for numerous companies and institutions in the field of creativity and innovation management and is active as a guest lecturer at international conferences and universities. In 2019 he was awarded an honorary doctorate from Aalto University, Finland.

Her films and lectures have increasingly addressed the presentational context of art, while her writing has circulated widely through publication in both academic and art journals, often online. She studied Documentary Film Directing at the Japan Institute of the Moving Image and at the HFF – University of Television and Film in Munich. She subsequently studied Philosophy at the Academy of the Arts in Vienna, where she received her doctorate. She is Professor for Experimental Film and Video at the UdK – University of the Arts, Berlin, where she founded the Research Center for Proxy Politics together with Vera Tollmann and Boaz Levin.

### Ippolito Pestellini Laparelli

Architect and founder of the interdisciplinary agency 2050



Ippolito Pestellini Laparelli is an architect and curator based in Milan. He is the founder of the interdisciplinary agency 2050+. Currently he teaches at the Royal College of Arts in London. Pestellini has recently co-curated Manifesta's 12th edition (2018) taking place in Palermo and has edited Palermo Atlas, the preparatory investigation on the Sicilian capital (Humboldt books, 2018). His projects include 'Panda', a research and exhibition for the 2016 Oslo Triennale, on the controversial impact of digital sharing platforms; Monditalia, a multi-disciplinary exhibition on the current status of Italy, at the 2014 Venice Architecture Biennale; the scenography for the Greek theater of Syracuse in Sicily (2012); and the co-curation of Cronocaos, OMA's exhibition on the politics of preservation at the 2010 Venice Architectural Biennale.

### Joanie Lemercier

Artist



Joanie Lemercier is a French visual artist and environmental activist whose work explores human perception through the manipulation of light in space. Working primarily with light projection and computer programming, Lemercier transforms the appearance of everyday objects and forms, bending reality to his imagination. His work transcends the flat surface, extending dimensionality through the interplay of light and shadow on materials such as wood, glass, paper, ceramics, textiles and water. Lemercier was first introduced to the process of creating art on a computer at agefive by attending classes on pattern design for fabrics that were taught by his mother. This early education grounded his interest in physical structures: geometry, patterns, and minimalistforms. As Lemercier's work evolved, he began to explore these elements throughthe physics and philosophy of how light can be used to alter perceived reality.

#### John Palmesino:

Architect at Territorial Agency



John Palmesino is an architect and urbanist and founder of the Territorial Agency; an independent organisation that combines research and action for sustainable spatial transformations. Recent projects include the Museum of Oil (with Greenpeace) and the Anthropocene Observatory. He is Unit Master at the AA Architectural Association School of Architecture, and convenes the MA in Research Architecture at Goldsmiths, University of London. He was previously Head of Research at ETH Zurich Contemporary City Institute—Studio Basel. John's work has been exhibited at documenta, Biennale di Venezia, Haus der Kulturen der Welt, ZKM Centre for Media and Arts.

#### José-Carlos Mariátegui:

Scientist, writer and curator



José-Carlos Mariátegui is a writer, curator and entrepreneur on culture and technology.
